Observing and measuring	Closely observes what animals, people and vehicles do. Observe changes over time With guidance, begin to notice patterns and relationships	Make systematic and careful observations Help to make decisions about what observations to make, how long to make them for and the type of simple equipment that might be used Begin to look for naturally occurring patterns and relationships and decide what data to collect to identify them	Make their own decisions about what observations to make, what measurements to use and how long to make them for Look for different causal relationships in their data and identify evidence that refutes or supports their ideas

Using equipment	Choose the resources they need for their chosen activities Handle equipment and tools effectively	Use simple measurements and equipment (<i>e.g. hand lenses, egg timers</i>) to gather data	Take accurate measurements using standard units Learn how to use a range of (new) equipment, such as <i>data loggers/thermometers</i> appropriately	Choose the most appropriate equipment to make measurements with increasing precision and explain how to use it accurately. Take repeat measurements where appropriate
Gathering and recording data	Create simple representations of events, people and objects	Record simple data	Collect and record data from their own observations and measurements in a variety of ways: <i>notes, bar charts and tables, standard units, drawings, labelled diagrams, keys</i> and help to make decisions about how to analyse this data	Decide how to record data and results of increasing complexity from a choice of familiar approaches: <i>scientific diagrams and labels, classification keys, tables, scatter graphs, bar and line graphs</i>
Reporting, presenting and communicating data/findings	Answer how and why questions about their experiences Make observations of animals and plants and explain why some things occur, and talk about changes Develop their own narratives and explanations by connecting ideas or events Builds up vocabulary that reflects the breadth of their experience	Use their observations and ideas to suggest answers to questions Talk about what they have found out and how they found it out With help, record and communicate their findings in a range of ways and begin to use simple scientific language	With help, look for changes, patterns, similarities and differences in their data in order to draw simple conclusions and answer questions Use relevant simple scientific language to discuss their ideas and communicate their findings in ways that are appropriate for different audiences, including oral and written explanations, displays or presentations of results and conclusions With support, identify new questions arising from the data, making predictions for new values within or beyond the data collected and find ways of improving what they have already done	Identify scientific evidence that has been used to support or refute ideas or arguments Use relevant scientific language and illustrations to discuss, communicate and justify their scientific ideas Use oral and written forms such as displays and other presentations to report conclusions, causal relationships and explanations of degree of trust in results Use their results to make predictions and identify when further observations, comparative and fair tests might be needed

Identifying and classifying	Develop ideas of grouping, sequences, cause and effect Know about similarities and differences in relation to places, objects, materials and living things	Use simple features to compare objects, materials and living things and, with help, decide how to sort and group them	Talk about criteria for grouping, sorting and classifying; and use simple keys	Use and develop keys and other information records to identify, classify and describe living things and materials, and identify patterns that might be found in the natural environment
Research using secondary sources	Comments and asks questions about aspects of their familiar world such as the place where they live or the natural world	Ask people questions and use simple secondary sources to find answers	Recognise when and how secondary sources might help them to answer questions that cannot be answered through practical investigations	Recognise which secondary sources will be most useful to research their ideas and begin to separate opinion from fact
